<b>Podmienky na absolvovanie predmetu:</b> 25% Active Participation; 75% Final 1000 word long written assignment on topic of student's interest consulted with instructor. Course evaluation (%): A – excellent: 100-93%, B – very good: 92-84%, C – good: 83-74%, D – satisfactory: 73-63%, E – sufficient: 62-51%, Fx – fail: 50-0%. Passing the course assumes that student was not absent at more than 4 class sessions. Late arrival is marked as a “tardie”. Three tardies equal one absence. Missing more than 15 minutes of the class is considered an absence.	
<b>Výsledky vzdelávania:</b> - introduce students into contemporary study of 1989 in Historiography. - introducing basic chronology of the events - being able to analyze two main grand narratives used in historiography - being able to orient themselves in topical study of the 1989 Revolutions - introduce various memory debates regarding the legacy of the events  This course does not seek to provide exhaustive treatment of this scholarship but rather to serve as introduction into the topic that can serve as start for further study. As such it provides overview of the most important and oft discussed literature on the subjects as well as examples of more topical studies devoted to 1989.
